A WORD ABOUT LENT

Lent is a period in the Christian calendar that's associated with some important traditions, including:

Journeying with Jesus toward Jerusalem and beyond

The gospel writers Matthew, Mark and Luke present Jesus' journey toward Jerusalem as an invitation for us to join Jesus on the way. According to Luke's gospel, immediately after Jesus 'set his face to go to Jerusalem' (9:51 NRSV) comes the narrative of 'the would-be followers of Jesus' (9:57-62). All three men for various reasons did not follow Jesus on the journey. Luke's guestion for us, therefore, is will we follow Jesus on the way to Jerusalem, or do we have other more urgent tasks to attend to? Through this Bible Study series and other resources for Lent we journey with Jesus to Jerusalem and beyond. We do this as disciples of Jesus today.

Engaging in the (re)building of relationships

The essence of Easter is about reconciliation – the renewed relationship of humanity with God. of humanity with each other, and with God's 'very good' creation.

Lent provides an occasion for us to mend broken relationships and build new ones and the opportunity to right the wrongs of both past and present. Lent also provides an opportunity to repent from the ways in which we trample upon the Earth.

Imposing limitations

Various practices of self-imposed limitations and restraint are usually exercised during Lent. These include observing a fast, giving up unhealthy habits, foregoing some level of comfort and luxury (for those who have them) or giving up certain foods and drinks. The motivation for such self-imposed limitations is quite noble – it is not simply an inward journey of desiring to be more Christlike, but also an outward journey of being an agent of God's love and compassion to a world that is hurting. To be Christ-like is to move toward a fuller realisation and sense of our common humanity and Lent provides an occasion for us to give up a part of ourselves in order that another may have the chance to live.

FROM THE AUTHOR

The season of Lent is here. Over the next six weeks we'll be journeying together through Lent to Easter. Thanks to Jesus' resurrection the journey takes on an unprecedented new beginning when death seemed to have won! We are part of this new journey and these studies are our resources on the journey. Let us pray together that we will all be enlightened, encouraged and strengthened as we go through the studies.

One useful and now common way of looking at the Bible is in terms of stories – stories about people, their cultures, experiences, fears and hopes.

Interwoven with these human stories are stories of God and stories about God as experienced and understood by the story-writers. We read these stories, learn from them, ask questions and think about how they do or don't resonate with our own

stories. How might the stories in the Bible guide and empower us as our own stories continue to unfold and develop before us and before God?

Ours is a storied world. Stories of the past and present abound and stories will be created for the future. Many of the stories that saturate the airwaves are on the negative side of the spectrum: death, war, suffering, poverty, injustice. At the same time there are also stories of generosity, kindness and hope. Jesus himself lived and worked in a world of contradictions and paradoxes. Over the next six weeks, with the Spirit of God to guide us, let us strive to discern how God's story of hope in Jesus Christ helps us to live and shape our own stories.

The theme of this Bible Study series is '40 Days of Hope'. The studies can be done in groups of two or more people, or used as a journey guide for individual reflection. The studies, which are based on the Gospel readings taken from the Revised Standard Lectionary, are as follows:

Hope Leads Us Forward: Deeds of Love Amidst Schemes of Death Each study follows a basic format. The studies are written in a way that encourages all participants to actively engage with the biblical texts. Prayers lead into and close each study while questions for personal meditation, prompts for group discussion and additional resources assist deeper thinking and active engagement. Each study also includes stories from UnitingWorld's partners around the world. These stories point us beyond ourselves and toward the experiences of our overseas church partners and the communities they serve.

Through these stories, we are given the opportunity to look at life from another point of view and to hope for a more just, equitable and humane society.

STUDY I

HOPE AND OUR CHRISTIAN JOURNEY: LIVING TODAY'S WILL OF GOD

Genesis 9:8-17 Gospel Reading – Mark 1:9-15 (cf. Matthew 4:1-11)

Opening prayer

Lord, remove the scales from our eyes this Lenten season and enable us to swallow our human pride so that we can respond to your call in our lives – especially when it challenges us. Amen

Introduction

Traditionally, the gospel reading at the start of the Lenten season focuses on the temptation of Jesus. The temptation of Jesus as told by Matthew is in mind in this study. Traditional interpretations of the three temptations say that the devil tempted Jesus with food and pleasure, power, glory, wealth and popularity. However, the devil's role in the temptations is far more subtle and points us to an understanding of our call to live today's will of God.

Read Matthew 4:1-11

Personal Meditation: What do you think this passage is about? What is your initial response? What main challenge does the story have for you?

Reflection

The story of the temptation of Jesus occurs immediately after his baptism by John in the Jordan, during which the Spirit of God came down on him and a voice from heaven affirmed him as 'my Son, the beloved, with whom I am well pleased.' What exactly is the role of the devil in the temptation of Jesus? A very brief look into each temptation will help us to address this question.

The first temptation was for Jesus to turn stones into bread to fill his stomach. What is so wrong with such a request? After all, Moses cried out to God in the wilderness and God sent down food for the hunary Israelites. Would God not do the same on behalf of the beloved Son? By performing such a miracle people would have recognised him as the New Moses, the prophet of the end time, the deliverer of Israel, and they would flock to his banner, After all. this was what the people had hoped and longed for. Was Jesus not aware of this? Was it the pinch of doubt that he was indeed the Son of God that held him back from performing the miracle? Whatever the reason, Jesus turned the temptation aside by responding that he would not live by bread alone but by 'every word that proceeds from the mouth of God.'

The second temptation was for Jesus to worship the devil in exchange for glory and authority. Exactly what did the devil show Jesus? It was the kingdom of David, which had grown to become a world empire. Expectations were exceedingly high amongst the Jewish people for the restoration of David's kingdom from the oppression of the Roman rulers. Restoration of Israel would be a vindication of the honour of God. So this temptation again reflected the collective consciousness and hope of Israel, and the perceived will of God for God's chosen people. Did Jesus not share this collective hope and consciousness? Did he not discern that restoration of David's kingdom was the will of God? Jesus again brushed aside the temptation with the words, 'It is written, worship the Lord your God, and serve only Him.'

The third temptation was for Jesus to prove himself a super human being who was immune to death by throwing himself from the temple pinnacle. Surely, the courtyard would be filled with people. They would immediately recognise him as the Chosen One of God to rescue Israel. After all. Malachi had prophesied that the Lord would suddenly appear to cleanse the temple of pollution and to purify the priesthood and restore true worship in Israel.

Was this the priestly Messiah? Once again the devil played into the collective expectations of the people. Jesus refused for the third time with the words 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test.'

Oh the subtlety of the devil's role! The devil tempted Jesus with what everyone knew to be the will of God: the Mosaic Prophet (Prophet like Moses); Davidic King (King in the line of David); and Priestly Messiah (Messiah who would restore the royal priesthood and true worship). There was nothing wrong with any of these. These were the very images of redemption which every Israelite believed God had given them though the Scriptures. However, when tested against his own sense of calling, Jesus saw these as second-best to that which God intended for them

What the devil offered to Jesus were not outright evils, but the highest goods known to Israel. This is when evil is most difficult to discern – when it offers the good instead of the best. The devil offered yesterday's will of God but Jesus was living out today's will of God through his declaration and practice of the reign of God. In the confluence of the devil's tempting and the enabling and strengthening power of the Spirit, Jesus was able to see the ebbing of an old novelty and experience the appearing of a new – that transforming power had begun

through him and the gospel that he preached and lived.

As we move through Lent, and through life, may we journey with Jesus Christ, living out God's will in every aspect of life, knowing full well that today's will of God may even go against public opinion and collective consciousness, and hence be quite counter-cultural. Let us affirm that with the Spirit's help we will!

Questions for Discussion

- Share an experience where you struggled to make a tough decision between conflicting and/or opposing opinions or possibilities.
- How might you be able to discern today's will of God on issues where public consciousness and popular opinions hold powerful leverage in decision making?

Going Further

Lent Event encourages participants to give up an everyday item to experience in part what it is like to live with less. Write down a list of things you could give up this Lent. After that, write a list of practices you'd like to take up this Lent. Look over each of the things you've listed and pray that God will enable you to learn what it means to live in today's will of God, even when it is countercultural or perhaps risky to do so.

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STUDY 2

HOPE FOR ALL PEOPLE: THE NEW EXODUS BECKONS

Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16 Gospel Reading – Mark 9:2-9 (2-29)

Opening prayer

Lord, I want to be part of your new people of God. Give me courage and strength. Amen.

Introduction

Last week we looked at the temptation of Jesus. One of our key points was that the devil's temptations represented yesterday's will of God, whereas Jesus was moving toward today's will of God. Today's reading is about the transfiguration of Jesus on a mountain-top. The text is located within the middle section of Mark's gospel where Jesus leaves Galilee and heads toward Jerusalem. A key theme in this section is the identity of Jesus, which is further unveiled as his journey progresses. Importantly, we

also learn what Jesus' identity means for our own discipleship. In 8:29 Peter declares Jesus as the Messiah. Not denying this, Jesus tells his disciples of the suffering and death that awaits him (8:31-32a). On the mountaintop Jesus' identity as God's Son is affirmed. The mention of Moses and Elijah and the voice from the clouds in the story take us back in time, especially to the exodus event.

Read Mark 9:2-29

Personal Meditation: What do you think this passage is about? What is your initial response? What main challenge does the story have for you?

Reflection

By placing the story of the transfiguration 'six days' after Peter's declaration and Jesus' response and assurance (8:27-9:1), Mark underscores that the call to discipleship is to be understood in terms of the promise of the kingdom and power of God, and the way in which that kingdom is revealed also in the death and resurrection of Jesus. What of the appearance of Elijah and Moses? The passing of these two figures were mysterious: Elijah went bodily into heaven (2 Kings 2:9-12) while Moses' grave was never found (Deuteronomy 34:4-7, hinting that he was buried by God). These two men of the faith were thought to be available for God to send back when the time was right to inform humankind that God's reign was at hand, which Jesus announced in Mark 1:15. It is no accident that these two appear with Jesus on the mountain. As they disappear into the cloud, which according to Exodus 40:34-38 is a sign of God's presence, the command comes to listen to Jesus. Now Jesus becomes the divinely chosen figure to announce the new dawn of God's reign.

The transfiguration of Jesus connects with the story of Moses' shining face when he met and spoke with God on Mount Sinai about the future of the Israelites (Exodus 34:29-35). In Jesus

God creates a new people who are invited to follow him in announcing and practising God's vision. It also connects with Daniel's Son of Man in dazzling white (Daniel 7:9-14). For Daniel this Son of Man will bring about God's will and justice. In Jesus we see the justice and goodness of God more clearly. As Jesus is transfigured we catch a glimpse of his reality as Son of Man, Son of God and God's chosen messenger of God's kingdom. In truth, therefore, Jesus is more than a messenger. Rather, he represents God's vision for all people and for the world.

Moses did not stay on the mountaintop forever and neither did Jesus and his disciples. They all had to descend the mountain and engage with the difficult and harsh realities of life, but not in a 'business as usual' frame of mind. Something had happened the transfiguration pointed them to new possibilities. Jesus had begun an unprecedented journey that would stop only momentarily in Jerusalem, and would then continue into the world upon his victorious resurrection.

The point of the story of mountaintop transfiguration is that all present would have to go back down the mountain, to the un-level and rugged terrains of life. The new exodus begun by Jesus calls us to a discipleship that requires descending from mountain-top spiritualities to the

life 'here below'. For us, this means engaging with life's challenges and fears and rejoicing with its successes and hopes, always following in the footsteps of Jesus, the leader of the new exodus toward the reign of God in the world today.

Questions for discussion

- Share an experience or a story that reflects aspects of God's transforming presence.
- 2. What other themes do you find embedded in the story that are meaningful to you?

Disability Inclusion in Sri Lanka

An excerpt from a blog written by UnitingWorld's Hannah Ireland

It was dusk when we arrived at the church in a small town in the Northern Province of Sri Lanka. Towns in this area were significantly impacted by the war and many people have only returned to their homes in the last few years. About twenty people came to meet with us - people with disabilities as well as the carers of people and children with disabilities. One elderly woman's story has stayed with me since.

As we sat in the church, she talked about how people from that area used to be full of dignity. They were proud people because they were good at farming the land and producing food. But early on in the war, 21 years ago, her nine year old daughter was hit with shrapnel from a bomb and completely paralysed. Eventually they had to flee their homes and she had to carry her daughter across hundreds of kilometres, constantly on the move until 2009 when, at the end of the war, she was finally able to return to her home. Now she's older, can't work and is the full time carer for her daughter. It doesn't help that there are very few services to assist her in caring for her daughter.

Her story is not unique. It is one that bears likeness to the stories of all the people who sat with us that evening, and to hundreds of other people with disabilities and their carers in Sri Lanka.

UnitingWorld has begun focusing on the inclusion of people with disabilities in the transformation of their communities. With 80% of people with disabilities living in the world's poorest communities, we know there is a relationship between poverty and disability that must be broken. Across all our projects

we are prioritising the inclusion of people with disabilities, and working alongside our partners to address the societal, cultural and physical barriers which block people with disabilities from participating. In Sri Lanka, we're focussing specifically on enabling children with disabilities to access quality, inclusive education, and promoting vocational skills training for young people with disabilities. When all people are included, there is real hope for the future.

A prayer for our partner

God of all people, today we remember the people of Sri Lanka who have experienced the reality of war in their lifetime. We pray for people all around the world who are living with a disability and feeling the weight of poverty. Thank you for people and organisations who are working to create opportunities for them.

Going Further

Read the excerpt and poem below:

"Disability unsettles easy assurances." It exemplifies how people can be represented in terms that exclude. Disability often signifies the way that some people are recognised

as lacking something basic to what is understood as human, being abnormal, a body gone wrong. The implications of such "recognition" – which is more adequately a 'misrecognition' – extend far beyond disability, and in fact touch on the cultural, social and religious systems by which human beings gain orientation in the world and traffic with each other."

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STUDY 3

HOPE FOR ALL CREATION: WHEN ECO-JUSTICE PREVAILS

Exodus 20:1-17 Gospel Reading – John 2:13-22

Opening prayer

Gracious God, we hold up to you for healing our relationships with the land and its peoples, mindful that this Earth is a gift from you and we are but stewards. Amen.

Introduction

This week we read the story of Jesus causing guite a scene in the temple in Jerusalem. The text has evoked multiple interpretations, including those that reject any sort of economic interpretation; those that see it more in terms of Jesus asserting himself as God's son and his body as the (new) temple; those that see it in terms of Jesus exercising and condoning violent actions: those that see it in terms of Jesus protecting animals and birds from being killed/offered as sacrifices: and those that see it as Jesus confronting and removing corrupt economic practices which hindered proper and authentic worship. As we go through this study, keep in mind the question: what does John want us to see?

Read John 2:13-22

Personal Meditation: What do you think this passage is about? What is your initial response? What main challenge does the story have for you?

Reflection

Jesus' visit to Jerusalem as recorded in this passage took place as the Jewish Passover festival was drawing near. The Temple in Jerusalem was the centre of the Jewish world, with an inner and an outer court. A market was taking place in the outer court when Jesus entered. What he saw angered him deeply. The question that stares us in the face is 'why did Jesus do what he did?'

Pilgrims from all over the Jewish world went to Jerusalem to celebrate Passover and offer sacrifices at the Temple. They also had to pay the Temple tax. To help those who'd travelled far two basic services were provided. Animals such as oxen, lamb and doves were sold and money changers were at hand to convert currencies into the coin accepted for the purchase of sacrifices and for paying the Temple tax. The sale of sacrificial animals and the exchange of currencies were, therefore, not the issue. So what was?

Brought up and taught strictly as a Jew, Jesus would have been aware of what was performed on Passover as a norm and what was not. In the outer court that day two market monopolies were in operation which squeezed money from those who came to worship. Firstly, there was a monopoly on the dove market. Secondly, there was a monopoly on the special coin that was used to purchase sacrifices and pay the Temple tax. Poorer people used doves for sacrifice and the only coin acceptable for Temple tax was a half-ounce of pure silver without the image of the Emperor. Unfortunately there was limited supply of these coins so money changers raised their prices. These monopolies imposed huge financial burdens on the poor and brought in exorbitant profits for the Temple authorities. In fact, the Temple sacrifice during the reign of High Priest Annas could be best summed up as the marketplace of the family of Annas. All of this merchandising made genuine and solemn worship difficult. Carson writes "Instead of solemn dignity and murmur of prayer there is the bellowing of cattle and bleating of sheep. Instead of brokenness and contrition, holy adoration and prolonged petition, there is noisy commerce." 1 It was indeed a marketplace instead of Temple!

It is no wonder that Jesus was angry and acted as he did.

Amongst other things, this text invites us to reflect on the challenges of economic and ecological injustices that occur under the name of economic development and growth. Economics (Greek oikos-nomos) and ecology (Greek oikos-logos) both have to do with the oikos or our home, the Earth. Both have to do with the way things relate and are integrated to make our home function properly. Lent opens up for us the sacred space to think deeply about the economic suffering of millions of people and the devastation of the Earth's environments in the name of economic growth.

Questions for Discussion

- Share an experience or a story about struggling to make a living, or simply surviving, in the midst of glaring economic poverty that has touched you deeply and changed you as a person.
- 2. In what ways does our own society take advantage of the most vulnerable within it? What do you think this passage says about what our response might be?

Home in rural Zimbabwe

It's not a long drive to Muzarabani four or five hours from Harare at most. But the township, reached by a single road which passes over hills and dusty plains, feels like a world away from Zimbabwe's capital city. Whereas Harare is an increasingly bustling city, you are more likely to see ox-drawn carts than cars in this rural area of the country. The bellowing of cattle and bleating of sheep are not out of place here. The township itself, which has several stores and a marketplace. acts as a gateway to more remote communities, some of which take several hours to reach.

In rural areas like Muzarabani many people survive off subsistence farming, selling small amounts of grain or vegetables at the local market and using the rest to feed their families and household animals. All over Africa today, families are feeling the brunt of unpredictable weather patterns more than ever. And with little to fall back on, families fear that drought will leave them with nothing.

With over 70% of people in Zimbabwe living below the poverty line, it's vital that families in rural areas are able to broaden their opportunities to earn a living beyond subsistence farming.

Mr and Mrs Mugeti are one such family. The couple have six children four boys and two young girls. They have witnessed with despair how their grain reserves have shrunk this year. Without a good harvest, how will they have enough to eat?

"Living here, we have so many challenges," Mrs Mugeti says, holding her youngest child on her hip. "The harvest has been very poor and we have no other source of income. Sometimes we do small jobs for other families who can afford to pav us. But more and more, families cannot afford this."

Over the past three years UnitingWorld has supported our partner, the Methodist Development and Relief Agency (MeDRA) to run a livelihood development project in Mr and Mrs Mugeti's community. The couple has recently joined a group which raises and breeds sheep.

"We are hoping the sheep will breed at least twice before we start selling them," says Mr Mugeti. "Because we are a group, we will share the profits. We are sure we will be helped by the project, but it will take time."

MeDRA's model of equipping families with diverse means to earn an income

has proved successful at building resilience in rural communities, and ultimately helping families break the poverty cycle. Members of other, longer standing livelihood groups including beekeeping and breeding chickens – currently receive USD50 from their activities each month. It may not seem like much, but this amount is used for buying food, paying for education and accessing transport and health care.

Over time, as the sheep breed and are sold at market. Mr and Mrs Mugeti can expect to be earning similar amounts. This will change not only their lives, but those of their children as well – a true message of hope for the future.

Going further

This week's materials remind us to think about the Earth as our home. In thinking of the Earth in these terms, we are able to see all people around the world as part of our own household, equally affected by the management of the household in terms of our global economy and shared environment.

Write a list of five rules you have instigated or experienced in your own household. An example might be – "in this house we share what we have". When you've finished, discuss them with your group and mark those which others have also written down.

Household rules

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Now create a second list of rules which you think would help all humans live peacefully, equitably and justly in the same 'global household'. An example might be – "in this world we treat others as we would want to be treated." When you are finished, discuss them with your group.

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STUDY 4

HOPE IN UNLIKELY PLACES: INCLUSION OF NON-BELIEVERS

Numbers 21:4-9 Gospel Reading – John 3:14-21

Opening prayer

God of all people, help us to recognise the human dignity that you notice, and not to stumble over the 'little ones'. We praise you for diversity of human beings with all their challenges, opportunities and rewards. Amen.

Introduction

We focus our attention this week on perhaps one of the most well-known of all Bible passages. A casual reading will show that John's gospel is guite different from the other three. Throughout the gospel opposites are pitted against each other: light or darkness: above or below: saved or condemned; in or out; us or them; flesh or spirit; believers or nonbelievers. One important factor will help us understand why dualistic thinking permeates John's gospel. That is the expulsion of the Johannine community from the synagogue. This community of Christian Jews believed in Jesus as God's Messiah and initially remained within the synagogue in an increasingly shaky relationship with synagogue authorities. It became difficult for the community, with their claims about Jesus and different worship

practices, to fit in with synagogue life. Eventually they were expelled from the synagogue. The dispute that lies behind John's gospel, therefore, is between two Jewish groups: one that was committed to synagogue life and practice and another that believed in Jesus as the Messiah. John's gospel embodies the beliefs and claims of this expelled community, who tried to maintain their own identity outside of the established synagogue life and practice.

Read John 3:14-21

Personal Meditation: What do you think this passage is about? What is your initial response? What main challenge does the story have for you?

Reflection

Today's passage is part of a longer discourse between Nicodemus and Jesus. Nicodemus was a member of the Sanhedrin and Jesus, according to the text, is the new Moses, Son of Man and Son of God. Eternal life belongs only to those who believe in God's only Son. Jesus' words raise some rather challenging questions for today: what about followers of other faiths, the billions who do not believe in Jesus let alone know him?

At the beginning of his gospel John introduces to the reader the cosmic and universal pre-existent Word that became flesh. This enfleshed Word was light for all people (1:4) through whom God demonstrated God's love for the world (3:16). The universality of God was/is not exhausted in the humanity and particularity of Jesus. God gives life to all people through the Spirit that 'blows where it chooses' (3:8a), and not only to certain people. The same Spirit gives life to all living beings (Psalm 104:29-30). Does this nullify belief in God's Son? Not at all! Believing in Jesus means trusting in him and his vision of God's reign for the Earth; it is giving one's heart and following Jesus. This leads to having eternal life now. Fternal life is the life that is lived in the awareness of God's presence, life lived in the realm of the spirit, life that is full, whole, abundant; it is life lived in the manner of Jesus where the 'other' is accepted and embraced within God's reign.

We live in a multi religious world so how do or must Christians relate to people of other faiths? These questions are of fundamental importance.

The UCA Doctrine Working Group has produced an excellent and invaluable paper, 'Living with the Neighbour who is Different: Christian Faith in a Multi Religious World.'2 Three theological affirmations for engagement are made: 'God is calling us to engage in conversation with people of other faiths... Christians are called to love the neighbour who is different... God has placed the contemporary Church in an ideal situation to engage in genuine dialogue with those of other faiths.' The paper highlights that mission is God's and the Church participates in it through dialogue from both heart and mind. Our motivation for evangelism is to 'grow Christ-like persons living in Christ-like communities, and not to add to the numbers in the Church.'

The challenge for Christians when speaking with people of other faiths is to take off our shoes and be open to the possibility that God awaits us in the most 'unlikely' places.

Questions for discussion

- Share an experience or story of talking with someone who belongs to another faith.
- 2. Archbishop Desmond Tutu argues strongly that *God Is Not Christian* in the book of the same title. What is your reaction?

Breaking down barriers Maluku

"I do not feel scared anymore."

How do you overcome fear when you have experienced conflict firsthand?

In places where sectarian violence, ethnic conflict and persecution have wrought havoc, the path to peace is often long and hard. It is a path along which truth-telling, building trust and encouraging new relationships to flourish are vital.

Ambon Island, in the Indonesian province of Maluku, is no different. With over 5000 people killed and a third of the population displaced during violence from 1998 to 2004, nearly everyone on the island was affected. Yet what was once the site of tension and conflict between different religious groups has become home to intentional efforts to build peace across the religious and cultural divide.

One of UnitingWorld's partners in Maluku working in this area is Gereja Protestan Maluku (Protestant Church of Maluku). GPM works to equip women to know their rights, earn sustainable livelihoods and promote peace as respected community leaders. Their model brings women from different religious backgrounds together, so

not only are women empowered, but the whole community experiences transformation.

"Before, I rarely came to Waai village," says young Muslim woman Lia, just one of the many women who have been brought together through GPM's work. "But since attending training with women from Waai. I do not feel scared anymore. Now I can visit and I am getting to know our brothers and sisters in Waai better."

The training has also made a big difference to Lia's own family.

"I have gained so much more knowledge in matters of social and economic problems, and the help of business capital to increase my economic income. In the past, I could only assist my parents with their business. Now I have my own business and my own savings."

Women like Lia are a vibrant example of the power of everyday people to break down the walls that divide, always looking to the future with hope. Those who were once the 'other' are now friends. A woman who once seemed like a stranger is now a neighbour. What once seemed impossible is coming to pass.

A prayer for our partner

Thank you God for the work of GPM in Maluku and many others like them. We pray you will continue to spread seeds of peace through their work.

STUDY 5

HOPE OVERFLOWING: A GLIMPSE OF LIFE AT ITS FULLEST!

Jeremiah 31:31-34 Gospel Reading – John 12:20-33

Opening prayer

Almighty God, who through your Son cautioned that it would not profit us if we gained the whole world, but suffered the loss of our souls: help us to live simply that the poor and less fortunate might simply live. Amen.

Introduction

Our passage for this study comes immediately after Jesus entered Jerusalem – for the third and final time – with shouts of Hosanna from the crowd, and his affirmation as 'the King of Israel' (12:13b-15). We are immediately introduced to 'some Greeks' who request to see Jesus. Surely hearing of the seven signs Jesus performed – the most recent being the raising of Lazarus from the dead – would have spurred them. Who were these Greeks? Did they get to see Jesus? John leaves these questions unanswered, inviting us instead to step into their shoes and participate in the unfolding drama that culminated in Jesus' death and his victorious resurrection. Do we as contemporary readers see Jesus as John wants us to? Do we feel what following Jesus means?

Read John 12:20-33

Personal Meditation: What do you think this passage is about? What is your initial response? What main challenge does the story have for you?

Reflection

Instead of granting or not granting the Greeks' request, Jesus' response refocussed the terms of discussion. on his ensuing death and glorification and their implications for discipleship, and for the 'ruler of this world'. Jesus' words echo those in Mark's gospel which say 'followers must lose their life in order to save it' (8:31-38). Discipleship was an invitation to follow Jesus to Jerusalem where suffering and certain death awaited him, but also to follow him from the resurrection where new life and possibilities would spring forth into the world.

Unlike the other gospels, John's narrative focuses on the conflict between Jesus and the life of discipleship on the one hand. and the ruler of the world on the other. In John's gospel the 'ruler of this world' is synonymous with the devil or Satan. However, as the unfolding narrative and drama would show the 'ruler of this world' is

also embodied and exposed in the 'locus of all (individual, institutional and systemic) power that does not recognise the rule of God.'3 At that time, this included Judas Iscariot, the soldiers and Temple police, religious authorities (Priests and Pharisees) and systems, and imperial authorities (Governor Pilate) and systems. For instance, in 13:27 Satan entered into Judas, and from chapter 18 on religious authorities connived with imperial authorities against Jesus. The conflict would end in Jesus being 'lifted up from the Earth' by crucifixion. It is from this vantage point that the counteracting grains of irony are displayed: the religious authorities would see this as victory over a self-proclaimed king and trouble-maker, and the imperial authorities would see this as success in keeping law and order. Not so, says John! The death and resurrection of Jesus is a judgment against the religious and imperial powers – and ironically – a victory over them! 'And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself' (12:32). For John this enthronement was a clear statement that Jesus, not the Emperor, was King. The cross is not a defeat but elevation and glorification; it is here, at the cross, when death seemed victorious, that life at its fullest is displayed.

The world has many ways of death: poverty and destitution; economic collapse; hunger and thirst; homelessness; sickness; war; violence against women and children; natural disasters; destruction of the environment. Our text urges that it is in these ways of death that we are drawn even closer to Jesus. Lent invites us to see the irony that in these ways of death is the promise and possibility of new life – eternal life.

Questions for discussion

- Share an experience or a story where, against all odds, life and love persisted and in the end proved victorious.
- 2. Discuss the relevance and significance of Jesus' words, 'And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw *all people* to myself,' in the context of religious pluralism and the world's many ways of death.

Training midwives in South Sudan: life in the midst of conflict

In mid-December 2013 conflict erupted in the world's newest nation, South Sudan. Sparked by accusations of a coup, conflict quickly escalated between groups loyal to both sides. Before long, the conflict moved from the capital Juba toward the oil fields in the north of the country.

When the fighting reached Leer, a small town in Unity State, homes were ransacked and razed to the ground. Fearing for their lives, local residents fled into the bush. Amid the chaos, the Leer Midwifery School, run by UnitingWorld's partner the Presbyterian Church of South Sudan, was also looted and destroyed.

In a small village not far from Leer, 24 year old midwifery student Teresa was also fleeing for her life. Along with her husband, Teresa hid in the bush while troops stormed through their homes. When they were able to return, Teresa learned she would not be able to return to Leer for her training. Instead, the Presbyterian Church had organised her travel to Lokichoggio on the Kenyan border. Once she arrived, she and other students were granted refugee status.

"There is no trained midwife in my village," Teresa said, reflecting on her desire to become a midwife. "I want to be a midwife so I can help pregnant women in my community by conducting safe deliveries."

The past year has been a nightmare for people all over South Sudan. By mid-2014 thousands of people had died. One million people were internally displaced inside South Sudan, while half a million people had fled into neighboring countries, hoping for safety and security.

Teresa and her fellow students will complete their studies in Kenya. From there, they will receive practical training and spend time at the nearby Kakuma Refugee Camp, home to over 130,000 people, where they will put their skills into practice. Yet like many of the students at the PRDA Midwifery Training School, Teresa has a real desire to work in her community back in South Sudan.

"I want to help the people in my community," she said. "I also want to provide for my family. One day, I would like to build them a concrete house."

Teresa and the other trainee midwives don't know what the future holds, or when they will return home. But in the face of death and destruction, these young women are learning how

to save lives. In the midst of conflict and disease, their skills will build a foundation of hope for a whole nation.

A prayer for our partner

Loving God, today we remember Teresa and her fellow students as they complete their studies in Kenva. We pray for long lasting peace in South Sudan, and thank you that these women will bring life and hope to their country.

Going Further

In June 2014 the UN refugee agency reported that the number of refugees, asylum-seekers and internally displaced people worldwide had, for the first time since World War II, exceeded 50 million people. When we think of South Sudan, Syria, Iraq and other countries where conflict. persecution and famine have caused people to flee, it is easy to think that death has won.

This week's study has called us to see the promise and possibility of life in even the darkest situation. As a group, discuss possibilities for responding to conflict and offering support to displaced people both here in Australia and overseas.

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STUDY 6

HOPE LEADS US FORWARD: DEEDS OF LOVE AMIDST SCHEMES OF DEATH

Jeremiah 31:31-34 Gospel Reading – Mark 14:1-11

Opening prayer

Saviour God, teach us to live the spiritual life, working together towards the realisation of your vision for a world healed and at peace, even when it seems to us an impossible dream. Amen.

Introduction

The Passover and festival of Unleavened Bread are only two days away and Jerusalem is a hive of activity. The stage is set for the final series of events that would lead to Jesus' death and culminate in his resurrection. Just before his death we are confronted with a powerful and beautiful story. This story is of an unnamed woman who anointed Jesus in the home of a leper named Simon. Get the picture? Jesus, with a leper and a self-invited woman with no name!

Read Mark 14:1-11

Personal Meditation: With your eyes closed, imagine the scene and try putting yourself into each character's place – Simon, Jesus, Unnamed Woman. What do you see? What do you feel?

Reflection

The text consists of three strands. with the second taking most space. and Mark weaves these strands masterfully. We begin with the first and third strands and then end with the middle strand.

In verses 1-2 the chief priest and scribes look for a way to arrest Jesus in secret and to kill him. Why all this scheming? In more than one way Jesus had confronted and angered these religious leaders upon entering Jerusalem. Many who came to celebrate Passover and the feast of Unleavened Bread were listening to and following him. He was becoming a real and imminent threat to the chief priest and scribes and their positions of power and wealth. In verses 10-11 we read how Judas Iscariot, for some unspecified reason, decided to change his allegiance. This was most welcome and timely news for the religious leaders. What made Judas side with them? Was his loyalty a tradable commodity? Or did he want to make Jesus do something more by forcing him into a corner? Whatever the reason, Judas 'began to look for an opportunity to betray him' (14:11).

Sandwiched between these two strands of plotting and colluding, from verses 3-9, is the courageous act of love of a woman at the

home of a social outcast. Having table fellowship was a practice for which Jesus was known. These fellowships were a demonstration of association and solidarity with people of low social classes and quite countercultural to the exclusive, lavish feasts amongst the upper echelons of society. A woman interrupted the meal and anointed Jesus' head with expensive perfume, likely imported from India, amounting to 300 denarii or a year's wage. And not just some of the perfume – all of it! The anointing was significant for at least two reasons: according to Jesus, it was a gesture to prepare his body for burial. It could also be seen as statement and affirmation that Jesus was royalty. Countering an objection by some who were present, Jesus gave the assurance that wherever the gospel is preached in the whole world she will be remembered for what she had done.

What did she do? She came and exercised selfless love in the midst of self-preserving schemes and collusions of death. A woman with no name being remembered as an integral part of the good news!

Lent presents us with the challenge to demonstrate true acts of compassionate love amidst the world's schemes of death. More specifically, today's text exposes

the scheming and collusion of mostly male-dominated institutional-structural-systemic power bases with misguided and self-centred individuals that lead to death and destruction. There is also good news: 'She has done what she could.' When we all do what we can in the love and spirit demonstrated by the un-named woman, together we will be, and are, a counteracting force sustained and energised by her memory, and propelled by the good news of God!

Questions for discussion

- Share an experience or a story about brave and compassionate deeds of women against many odds.
- 2. In memory of an un-named woman: can someone without a name be remembered?

Listening to the Wisdom of Women

An excerpt from a blog written by UnitingWorld's Bronwyn Fraser.

Recently I returned from a visit to Vanuatu. My role there was to sit with the leaders of the Women's

Fellowship and to help design the "Gender and Leadership" program they want to run for their communities.

Violence, especially against women, is a huge issue in the Pacific. There is a lot of work being done in response, much of which is based on notions of human rights as enshrined in various United Nations conventions. Now I don't have a problem with that. But as I have sat with women from various island nations across the Pacific, as well as participated in a number of Aid Sector forums on the subject, I have made two observations:

- Most of these programs focus on the problem more than the people.
- Most programs cling to "UN speak" – using language that is often disconnected from Pacific faith and culture.

As I sat talking with Melody, Cyrilline and Martha, in lovely circular conversations as is the way of *talanoa*, of story and of life, I caught their vision of a different way.

As we sat together on the mat, Melody, Cyrilline and Martha told me their own stories. They told me of the violence they have seen and experienced in their own families. They told me of the fear many women have, and the lack of opportunities for women to lead and flourish.

These courageous women spoke of the love that God has for creation and humanity. For them gender rightfully isn't just about women, and the problems communities face aren't just problems of violence. Gender is about men and women created as equals in the image of God, respectful relationships and recognising the inherent dignity of all people. Despite their own experiences, they don't want to paint men as the bad guys and women as the victims. Rather they want to lead a program that is inclusive of the voices of all people.

They told me they see violence as an outplaying of an unbalanced human system, one that has strayed from God's design. And the only way back is to build their Gender and Leadership program on the foundation of God's word. Without this real change will not happen.

God, we thank you for women like Melody, Cyrilline and Martha. We thank you for their vision and their leadership. We pray you will continue to work through them, your Spirit bringing new life and transformation.

Going Further

Each study over the past six weeks has highlighted a unique story from Jesus' journey toward the cross. At the same time, we've read the inspiring stories of the partners and local communities with whom the Uniting Church in Australia is in relationship through UnitingWorld. Each story highlighted the lifetransforming way that God is at work in the world – sometimes in the most surprising ways.

In this last study we have learned of courageous women who seek to overcome cultural norms and prejudice to do remarkable things. One, unnamed woman sat at Jesus' feet in an amazing display of sacrifice and understanding of Jesus' position. And in Bronwyn's blog we read of three, this time named women who are seeking to overcome deeply embedded cultural practices, allowing space for God to move in transforming and healing ways.

As you think back over the stories we have read these past six week, which story has meant the most to you? How might this story impact your own? How could you share it with others? Discuss this with your group.

Prayers come in different forms. Sometimes they are short breath prayers. Other times they are long conversations with God. Prayer has the power to move us beyond ourselves in to the world around us.

So it is with a prayer walk. Think of it as praying on-site with insight, as some have said. Sometimes we're too busy going about our day to recognize the needs of those in front of us. Have you stopped to wonder about the school in your neighbourhood? Or the neighbours down the street? By going on a prayer walk, we open ourselves up to God's guidance and transformation for the community, and for ourselves as God's hands and feet to those we meet.

As you walk around the neighbourhood by yourself or with a group, pray aloud in a quiet, conversational voice or silently. Offer prayers of comfort or peace or blessing as you encounter

different spaces in your community. Perhaps you do this at the start of a new school year, or as you notice transition in the neighbourhood.

Here are some ideas of what to pray for:

Discernment: Ask God how to see the community through a different lens. Where is God already at work? How can you join?

Empathy: What are those things individuals in your community are experiencing? Brokenness? Joy? As Romans 12:15 says, "Be happy with those who are happy, and cry with those who are crying."

Blessing: Pray for each person, home and business vou encounter.

Maybe in praying this way, you, too will be transformed.
